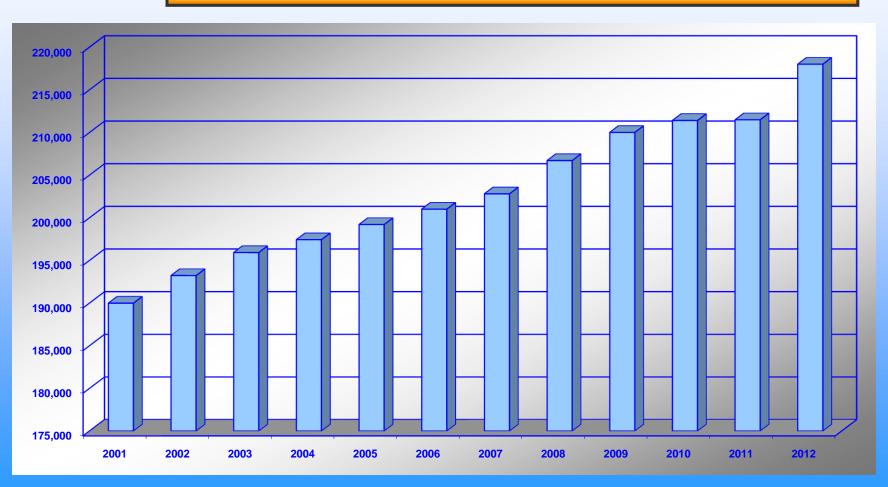

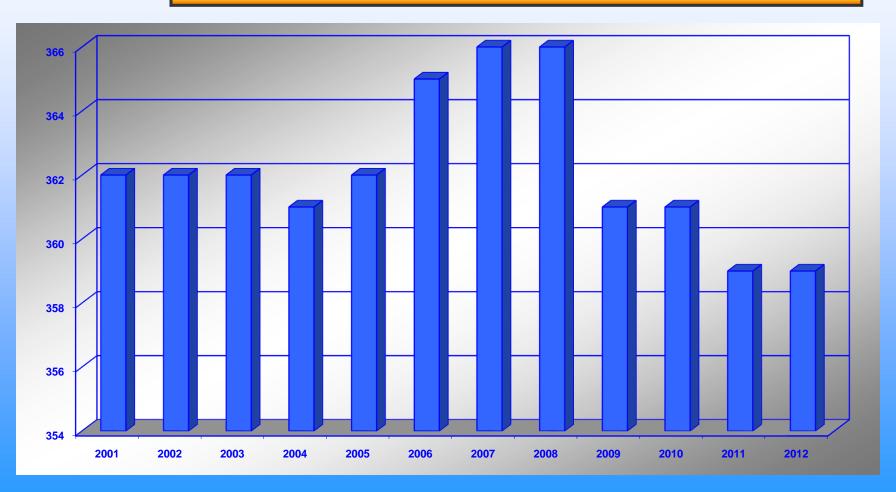

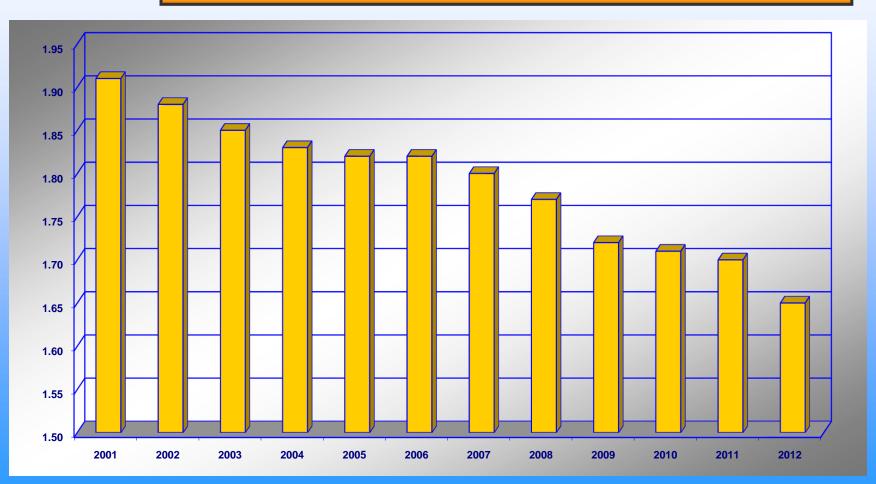


Police Officers

Training

- Once hired, officers are assigned within the department until their training begins.
 - 97 hours of Pre-Academy Training
 - Police Officers attend a 20 week session of the Northern Virginia Criminal Justice Academy
 - 140 hours of Local Training
 - 12 weeks of Field Training
- > Every two years all officers must re-certify by attending **40** hours of In-Service Training.
 - 4 hours Firearms Training
 - 4 hours of Legal Training
 - **2** hours of Cultural Diversity
 - 30 hours of General Training

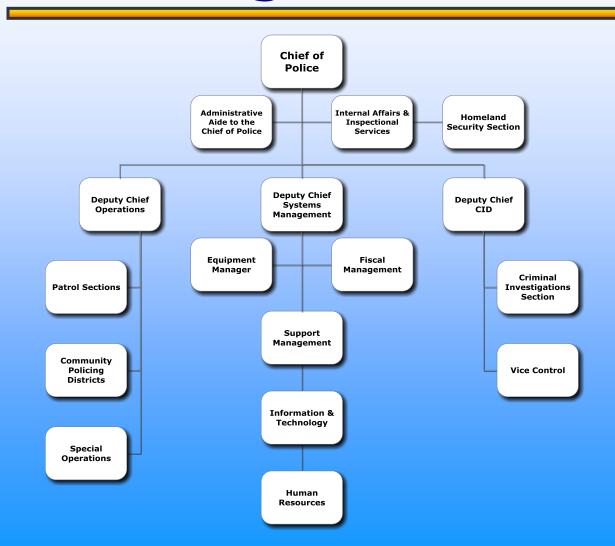

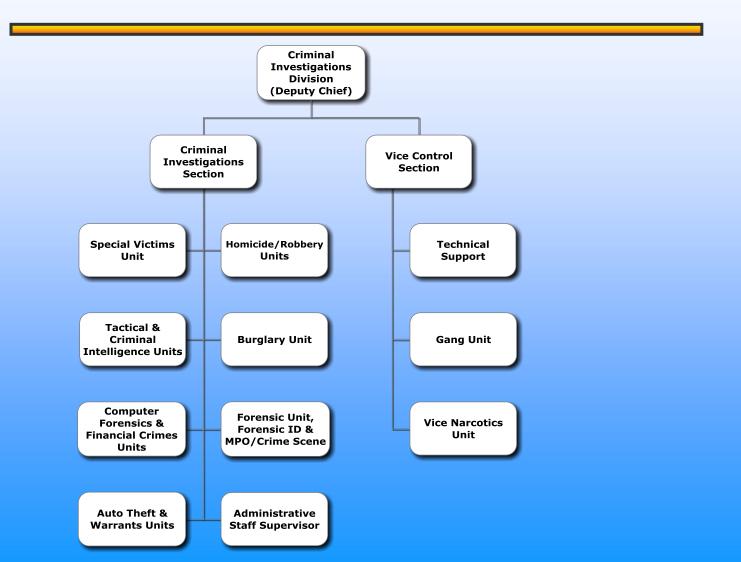


Executive Level Organization



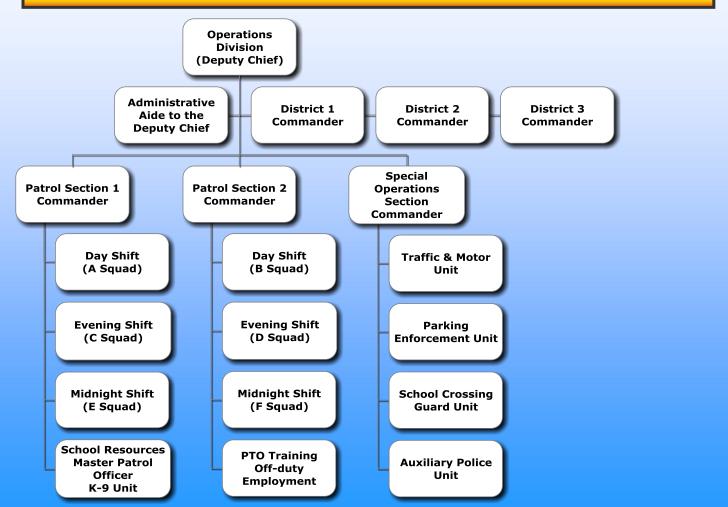

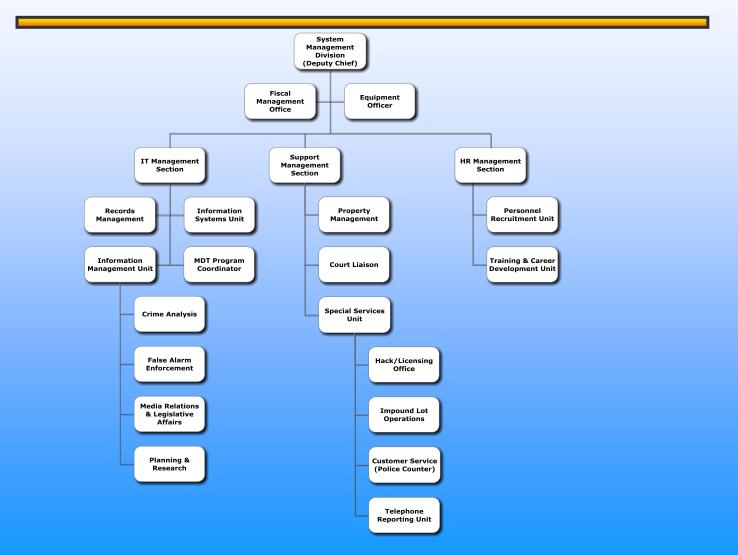

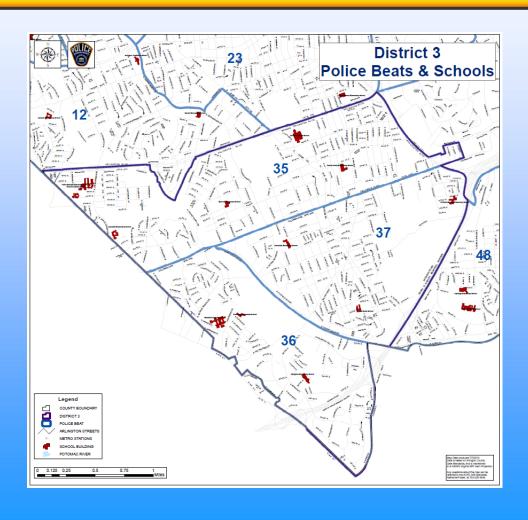

Key Changes for FY 2012

- Increased over strength positions for 5 to 10
 - Positions funded at 50% or \$354,645.00
- County Funding added for two grant positions \$183,057.00
 - Project Peace grant expired
 - Regional Gang Task Force grant funding is uncertain
- \$307,946.00 added for IT Maintenance
- Decreased Photo Red Light Revenue \$369,600.00
 - Due to implementing 4 versus 11 intersections

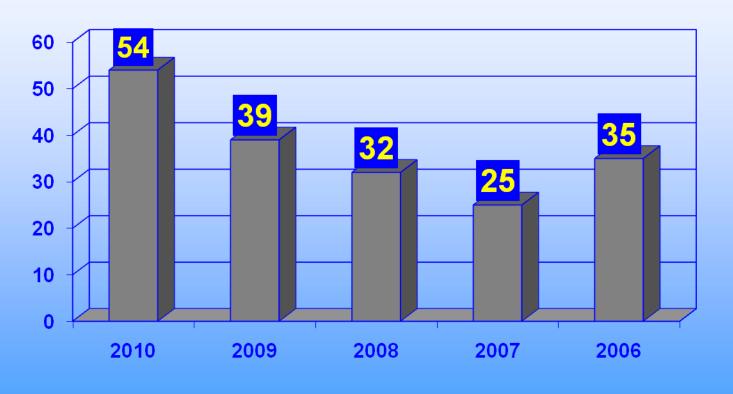

Through the use of the current budget, and with grants, the department has made significant improvements in the equipment needed to respond to terrorist incidents.

In an effort to be better prepared to respond to incidents, members of the Police Department routinely participate in drills and exercises with other agencies both in the County and in the region. Some examples are:

Homeland Security Section

The Homeland Security Section of the Police Department was established approximately three years ago. The Section, which is staffed by a Captain, Sergeant, and three detectives, is responsible for handling County intelligence related matters, regional Intelligence sharing, and serving as a liaison with other similar agencies in the region. This includes:

A local police department receives a report of suspicious activity and enters all available information into eGuardian.



This preliminary report goes to the state's primary fusion center (or some similar entity), where trained law enforcement analysts or officers review it for a possible terrorism nexus.



If there is a potential link to terrorism, the report is uploaded to eGuardian and becomes available to all law enforcement with access to the system.



The report will also be entered into our internal Guardian system, where it will be assigned to the appropriate Joint Terrorism Task Force for follow up.

The Section was established through a re-organization of positions within the Police Department.



Training - Patrol
