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## President's Corner

Welcome,

The past year has one of the most consequential in my lifetime. Now that we are coming out of the global pandemic, the end of my full term as president soon approaches. When I assumed the duties as acting president in the wake of Sandy Newton's resignation, the Civic Federation still met in person. Since that time, we have lived through a global pandemic, racial unrest, political violence, and a shutdown of our schools, workplaces, and many places of business. Our Civic Federation meetings, many of our jobs, schools, and much of our lives were forced to move online.



Now that the coronavirus vaccine has been a great success and the majority of adults in Arlington are now fully vaccinated; restrictions on social gatherings have been lifted, and business and schools are reopening.

In the public sphere, Arlington County has launched several initiatives to address issues around Diversity, Equity and Inclusion; including the Police Practices Group to reevaluate the role of police in Arlington, removing the old county logo, and a committee to rename Lee highway.

Last fall at the start of my term, my stated themes for this year were diversity and equity. Much work has been done, including welcoming new member organizations the Arlington NAACP and Our Revolution Arlington, and launching the Diversity committee, and the Task Force in Governance and Election Reform. We have also had several very important panels that have raised awareness of the status of Civil Rights in Arlington (see white paper [here](#)); Equity in access to open spaces in Arlington ([white paper](#), and [resolution](#)), Qualified Immunity, and the Police Practices Group (PPG) (presentation [link](#)).

Much work remains to be done, but I would like to take a moment to thank several people who have made great contributions to the Civic Federation, and Arlington.

- Burt Bostwick, long-time member, is stepping down as Treasurer, and chair of the Revenues and Expenditures committee
- Michael Beer, stepping down as chair of the Schools Committee
- Tina Worden, stepping down as Vice-President, and communications chair.

I could write pages about all the work these folks have done, but I will just extend my sincere gratitude for their service.

Looking forward, we will have our annual elections at the June 15<sup>th</sup> meeting. The new board will begin planning for a return to in-person meetings, and expand the membership of the Civic President.

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## Capital Improvement Project

The Civ Fed June 15 meeting will feature a 20-minute segment on the County Manager's proposed Capital Improvement Plan (CIP) and November Bond referenda, with an overview by County staff and Q&A thereafter. This new three year proposal (FY 2022-2024) follows a pandemic-induced one year CIP adopted last summer, and the County expects to return to a traditional 10-year plan next year for FY 2023-2032.

The short-term CIP reflects immediate priorities such as bridges, street paving and safety improvements through Vision Zero, technology infrastructure and Metro funding, along with selected parks and public space enhancements and planning and design for an Arlington Boathouse at Rosslyn on the banks of the Potomac. A public hearing is slated for June 29, with County Board CIP adoption on July 17. Bonds will be on the November 2 ballot. 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## Update from Livability 2202

At the June meeting, Livability2202 will be updating the status in a broad overview of the activity and incredible changes occurring in our area.

With 5 twenty-story buildings under construction, 7 in the planning process and at least 3 more rumored to be coming, 2202 zipcode has significant construction. Clearly just dealing with all the planning meetings is a challenge. In addition, there are several planning studies, such as the Pentagon City Planning Study, which are currently being formulated.

With all of this activity, the three civic associations have joined together to create Livability2202. Besides responding to the planning meetings, six working groups have been formed: Housing, Open Space, Route 1, the Underground, schools and theater.

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## Safety and Innovation Zone

Arlington County Government has a new demonstration project that will create a “Safety and Innovation Zone” in the Clarendon area. The goal of the yearlong pilot is to evaluate the impact of emerging technologies such as the Internet of Things (IoT) and Artificial Intelligence (AI) on public safety and to learn how they can benefit the County's response and serve as a new resource for information. This will be done by outfitting existing streetlights along the 2900 block of Wilson Blvd. with sensors. The effort is slated to be presented at the Civic Federation October 2021 meeting. 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## Legislation Committee Program on School Climate – Jun 15, 2021

School climate relates to the emotional, mental and physical health of students and staff. State legislation and local policies can improve school climate. Confirmed program participants as of June 1, 2021 are:

- Dr. Kristin Devaney, Supervisor of Counseling, Arlington Public Schools
- Dorian Brooks, Arlington County Police Department. Detective Brooks is a School Resource Officer. He has a Bachelor of Science Degree from James Madison University.
- Lori Haas, Senior Director of Advocacy of the Coalition to Stop Gun Violence. Ms. Haas is an advocate for gun violence prevention. Her family's story relating to the 2007 Virginia Tech shooting was featured in Cosmopolitan Magazine in 2017.
- Amy Peterson, LCSW, Coalition for Trauma-Informed Schools. Ms. Peterson has a Masters in Social Work from Virginia Commonwealth University, and is in private practice at the Center for Attachment and Trauma Services, Inc.

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## Environmental Affairs Committee Update Read out from the Second Public Collaborative on Preserving Arlington's Tree Canopy May 22, 2021

Drawing on the results of the first Collaborative, six smaller teams further explored the key concerns identified with the participation of a broad range of stakeholders. The teams worked to foster a consensus on solutions and strategies for mitigating the issues involving Arlington's tree loss as listed below:

- Improving County management of our urban forest
- Financial and other resourcing for tree programs and activities
- Incentives for developers to preserve trees
- Zoning affecting tree preservation
- Enhancing enforcement under current regulations
- Correcting current inequities in the tree canopy

The results from each team have been reported to ACCF and will be posted on the website. The teams have decided to continue their work into the future and will forward any recommendations to ACCF as they are finished. The teams will continue to have an "open door" approach inviting all ACCF members and County stakeholders to participate in areas

of the greatest interest or concern to them.

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## Public Services Committee Resolution

The Public Services Committee's [Resolution](#) Requiring Publication of External Consultant Report on the Police Practices of Arlington (Resolution). The Resolution stems from the County Board asking the County Manager to review police policies and practices in July 2020, following events involving policing and racial justice across the United States. The PPG External Assessment to be completed by the paid External Consultants has not been delivered to the public as of May 2021, six months after the expected contractual delivery date by the paid consultants. Some PPG areas to be addressed in the External Assessment is proceeding in the budget process without clear guidance via the assessment. Thus, the Resolution seeks immediate action by the County to deliver the External Assessment.

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## Board of Directors

At the April Board of Directors meeting, the Board voted to approve both the [Resolutions](#) [Procedures](#) and the [Parliamentary Procedures](#). The first provides a step-by-step process for all resolutions. If you want to introduce any new resolutions, be sure and review this document.

The second is the base set of rules for meetings. In prior years we used Robert's Rules of Order. The new set of procedures is a much shorter and simplified version of Roberts.

There are a few minor changes, but most delegates will not notice the difference. Both procedures will be on the website under the Documents->[Procedures](#) tab.



### Status Summary

Election of Officers and Directors are held each year, at the Annual Meeting. The 2021 Annual Meeting will be held on **June 15, 2021**. The ACCF Bylaws require a 5-person nomination committee selected by the general membership each year. The following individuals are serving on this committee: Juliet Hiznay, Chair, Alistair Watson, Vice-Chair, Nadia Conyers, Member, Stefanie Pryor, Member and Don Gurney, Member. The Nomination Committee has met several times over the course of April and May. Establishing strong and transparent outreach has been a committee priority. The Committee adopted a communications plan that include direct e-mail, newsletter updates, General Membership meeting announcements, social media and a press release.

### Additional Information

This report includes only those nominations that have been submitted to date. To qualify for ACCF leadership, the nominee must be a Delegate or Alternate of an ACCF member membership organization in good standing.

**Nominations continue to be accepted.** To submit your nomination, please fill out the [Nomination Form](#) online. All qualified nominees will be on the ballot. The Bylaws require that nominations be permitted from the floor during the Annual Meeting.

If there are nominations during the Annual Meeting, the ballot will need to be revised to include those names of additional nominees who qualify for ACCF leadership before it can be issued to the voting members.

Only those persons who attend the June 15, 2021 meeting will be eligible to vote. Member organizations may receive up to 4 votes. All Delegates may vote. Alternates who plan to vote in lieu of a Delegate must provide advance notice, or they will not receive a ballot.

### Committee recommendations relating to the nomination process

The Nomination Committee discussed ways to improve the nomination process, as well as some ways that the ACCF could address some of the internal governance challenges to improve retention of ACCF leadership.

#### I. General Recommendations Relating to Internal Operating Procedures / Requiring Bylaws Amendments

a. Consider adding another Vice-President with more specified roles in order to spread burdens, such as

i. VP for Membership & Communications. This vice president will support the President relating to communications with the membership and

membership outreach.

ii. VP for Programming. This vice president will support the president relating to the calendar and agenda for meetings and help coordinate with Committee Chairs relating to educational programs and presentation of resolutions at general membership meetings.

b. Adopt Internal Operating Procedures

i. Clarify the role of members, committees, committee chairs, officers and directors

ii. Adopt an ethics policy

iii. Adopt internal financial controls

iv. Adopt a communications policy relating to media contact

v. Adopt procedures for the Nomination Committee

c. Amend the Bylaws to allow for a Nomination Committee of 3-7 members

d. Adopt Nomination Committee Procedures

## **II. Committee Recommended Nomination Committee Procedures**

a. The President will present Nomination Committee candidates for approval by the General Membership at least ninety (90) days prior to the Election at the Annual Meeting (February or March membership meeting).

b. Once elected, the President will appoint one of the members to convene the first meeting of the Nomination Committee.

c. Nomination Committee members will select their own Chair.

d. Committee business will be conducted primarily in meetings to ensure transparency among members. All decisions relating to outreach will be determined by the full committee.

e. Outreach to recruit candidates for office include: press releases, social media, emails to all Delegates and Alternates, targeted outreach by email or telephone as approved by the Nomination Committee.

f. Nomination Committee reports must be published in the newsletter, and updated as appropriate, leading up to the election.

g. No more than one current Officer or Director may serve on the Nomination Committee.

h. The role of the Nomination Committee is to ensure that nominees meet criteria established in the Bylaws and in the Nomination Committee Procedures

i. The election must be open. The Nomination Committee does not select candidates, or limit the number of candidates. The membership votes for the candidates. If there are contested seats for officers, all nominees will be presented on the ballot. If there are more candidates for at-large seats than position, those with the highest number of votes will be selected. If there is a tie, a runoff election will be held, if necessary, to determine the winner.

j. The Nomination Committee will use standardized form(s) for nominations.

i. All nominees must consent to serve.

ii. Nominees may self-appoint.

iii. All nominees must sign a statement of intent to ensure their availability during the entire term of office. This will include a statement relating to not running for or serving in elected public office during the ACCF term of office.

iv. Nominee meets criteria as a Delegate or Alternate of a Member Organization in good standing.

k. Nominations will be permitted from the floor during the Annual Election.

l. Nomination Committee members will be provided access to member rolls and meeting attendance data. Use of personal data by the Nomination Committee is strictly limited to committee business. Nomination Committee members are not permitted to use or share personally identifiable data for any other purpose.

m. In any direct outreach to recruit members of the Nomination Committee and candidates for ACCF leadership, ACCF leadership and the Nomination Committee will be mindful of the diversity policy (to be adopted).

n. The ballot process/counting will be carried out by Delegates/Alternates who are not on the ballot.
